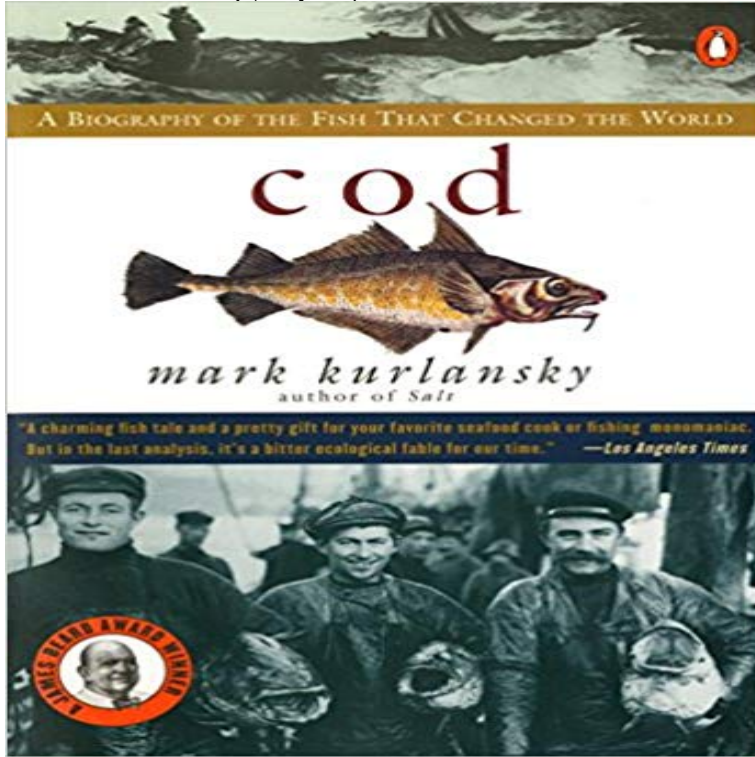


# Cod: A Biography of the Fish that Changed the World
