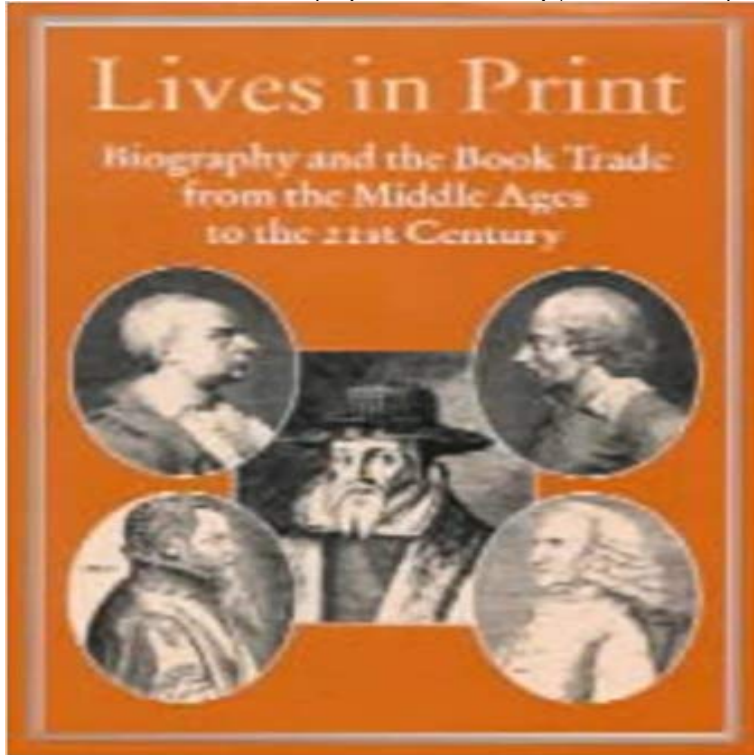


# Lives in Print: Biography and the Book Trade from the Middle Ages to the 21st Century (Publishing Pathways)
