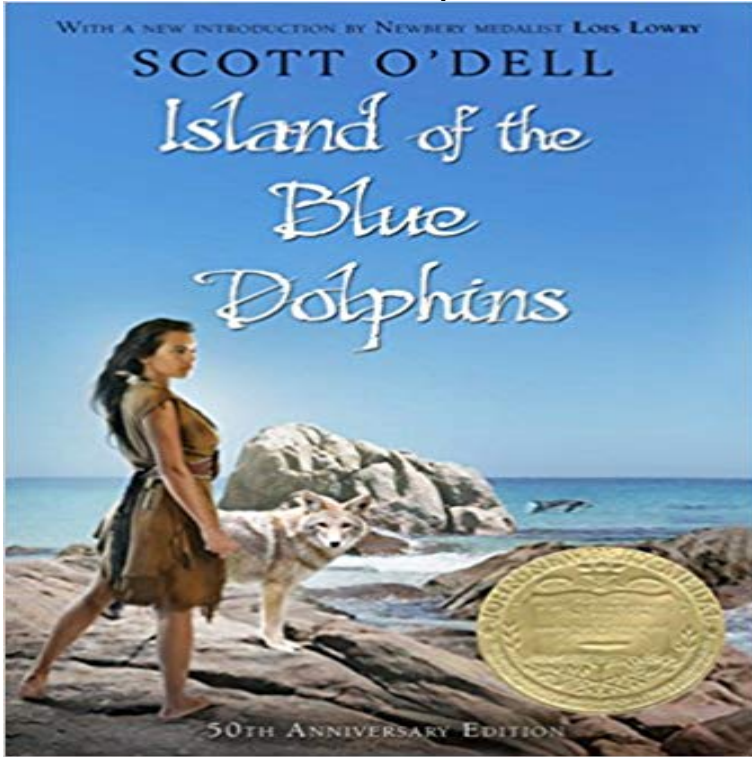


Island of the Blue Dolphins
